

#### Rabbits Term 2

We will be starting next term with 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears' and 'The Little Red Hen' and then starting our topic 'Let's Celebrate'. This will naturally include Christmas! We will be using lots of Christmas stories in the run up to the end of term.

#### Squirrels Term 2

In Term 2, our topic will be Heroes and Villains. We will be focusing on historical figures and how they have changed the way we live today, as well as using a wide range of literacy to support this. In Science, we will be learning about exercise and what makes up a healthy diet through a variety of hands on activities. Throughout all the subjects, the children will be linking their learning back to Superheroes and Villains. This will be done through Art and DT projects, as well as using ICT to research these figures. Please note our PE days in term 2 will be Wednesdays and Fridays.

#### Foxes Term 2

Foxes class have had an amazing 1<sup>st</sup> term. We have worked hard and made great progress!

This term our topic is Yabadabadoo! and we will be learning all about the Stone Age. In history we will research Stonehenge and learn about who built it. In Geography we will be studying key aspects of earthquakes and mountains. In English, our main text is 'Stig of the Dump', written by Clive King. In Maths this term our topics are multiplication and division. Our topic for Science is rocks and we will be exploring different kinds of rocks and their physical properties. In RE we will be learning about Sikhism and how it is incorporated into the life of a believer.







#### Badgers Term 2

Term 2 is all about space for Badgers! We'll be reading 'Cosmic' by Frank Cottrell-Boyce as our class text. It would be very helpful if this could be bought for your child to bring in to school but not read ahead as we had a few spoilers last term! In science we're going to have a close up look at the solar system and topic is all about humans in space. RE ties in with the science of space as we're learning about how the bible describes the creation of earth. In maths we're continuing our learning by progressing to multiplying and dividing up to four digit numbers and then moving on to fractions. We will also be having **Forest School** on Fridays. This will be in all weathers so please make sure children are dressed appropriately-wellies and waterproofs at the ready! A busy and fun filled term to take us to Christmas! #### Should I send my child to school?



With the changing seasons, it is inevitable that we will all start to get coughs and colds. Parents are now finding it harder than ever to decide if they should keep their child home. Please see the guide below to help you in making this decision.

With the symptoms your child is displaying, would you have kept your child off school before covid-19?

Speak to 119 or go to the www.gov.uk/coronavirus website and arrange for a self-test to be done.

Your child and your household must self-isolate until you have the result of this test.
