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
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# Attendance








This term in Rabbits we continued to look at some traditional tales, Goldilocks and The Little Red Hen, amongst others. We all enjoyed making porridge, bread and tasting different types of bread. The children have really impressed us with their enthusiasm for RWI, learning new sounds and letters and all trying really hard to write their names independently. The children have settled into school so well and have really bonded as a group. We've been enjoying some Christmas activities, reading stories about elves and hearing all about the children's naughty elves at home.

The Squirrels have been fantastic this term. They have really got involved in our Topic of 'Heroes and Villains.' We have focused mainly on Geography, looking at local cities and towns and comparing them to others such as Sydney, Australia. From this, we explored the difference between physical and human features and used this knowledge and our knowledge of map symbols to create our own Superhero islands. In addition, we are now looking at historical 'heroes' who have made huge impacts on the world. We have been learning about the life of Rosa Parks. In Religious Education, the children have been learning about World Faiths and we have been using stories of these faiths to bring lots of deep and meaningful discussion. A notable lesson includes the children making 'Diwali Lamps' as a celebration for Diwali (the celebration of light). In English and Maths, the children have been working exceptionally hard and their reading and writing has come along brilliantly. We are reading lots of superhero books and the children have been really engaged throughout. Finally, in Art, we have used our topic to create our own 'Supertato's' which was a link to one of our stories as well as making superhero pop art words that the children really focused on and created some fantastic work. Well done for a brilliant term Squirrels!





Foxes class have had a great term two. They have worked hard and continued to make good progress!


There has been some brilliant poetry and descriptive writing in English, with lots of adventurous vocabulary and punctuation being used. The children have enjoyed learning all about the Stone Age and have completed some wonderful Stone Age cave art. In Maths this term, the children have made lots of progress in understanding and becoming confident in how to multiply and divide. They have been able to use this knowledge to help them with mathematical problem solving. In Science, the children have loved designing and carrying out their own experiments. They have been asking lots of great questions and finding ways to answer them!

Owls have had a very busy Term 2. We delved further into our topic 'World War II' and children have produced some very exciting pieces of creative writing as part of this topic. We have thoroughly enjoyed our class text linked to WWII which has been very thought provoking and emotional at times. Owls class have shown great empathy and understanding for the war times and the people who suffered. In Science we have enjoyed making periscopes as part of our unit 'Light' and also investigated why arrows flip when we look at them through a glass of water! Children have enjoyed their investigations and have always spoken and reasoned scientifically during all lessons. In Maths, children have continued to work hard and made great progress with our fractions, decimals and percentages unit especially as we made connections between these concepts and their utility in the real world.

Our teaching team in Owls class are incredibly proud of all the children, their work ethos and their team spirit. As a cohort they are a real credit to the school, well done Owls, this has been a great term and we are already looking forward to the next one!







Badgers have had a fantastic term 2. We've enjoyed exploring space and thinking about the life of an astronaut. Thankfully for us SpaceX has been busy so we've watched quite a few rocket launches, including a few of our own! Another highlight has been forest school, we have made bug hotels, learnt about the wildlife in our environment and how to look after it. We have even made lovely Christmas decorations from a silver birch tree. In English we have had fun reading Cosmic and basing our writing around Liam and his out of this world adventures.

#### Should I send my child to school?



With the changing seasons, it is inevitable that we will all start to get coughs and colds. Parents are now finding it harder than ever to decide if they should keep their child home. Please see the guide below to help you in making this decision.

With the symptoms your child is displaying, would you have kept your child off school before covid-19?

Keep your child off school.

Keep your child off school and at home.

Speak to 119 or go to the www.gov.uk/coronavirus website and arrange for a self-test to be done.

Your child and your household must self-isolate until you have the result of this test.

Do they have:

 A new, continuous cough? (Coughing a lot for more than an hour or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours – if you normally have a cough, it may be worse than usual.)
